- 4.a Director Sosa Cruz introduced new employee, Shanesa Mykoo, Building Permit Coordinator.

**5 Additions, Deletions or Withdrawals to the Agenda**

Manager Shafran requested that item 12.f under New Business be moved up to after Public Comments.

Commissioner Ross requested a brief discussion added regarding the Manager's weekly report and the listing of code issues. It was added as item 12.h under New Business.

6 Public Comment Related to Agenda Items / Good & Welfare

Barbara Kuhl: In favor of keeping sanitation in house. Staff feels that only one truck is needed. Bring back the median service in house. Increase their wages. Increase the fee to keep it in house. Many emails going out and different figures are being provided. If kept in house, there is no money. If out sourced, will not change. The administration fee is almost \$190,000. In prior years it was \$50,000 and now it is up to \$190,000. What has changed? We have a great crew, great facility. On item 12.f, the Boy Scouts discriminate. Biscayne Park should not provide the use of a facility at no charge for a group that discriminates.

Dennis Murphy: My house was originally part of the original Public Works property. Most familiar with that group. They respond to our needs. Our crime rate is low because they keep an eye out. Don't want to see bins out on our streets. Our obligation is to our employees and not to save a few dollars.

Dan Rodriguez: Last time I spoke I suggested privatization. But I am now reversing my view on it. When Katrina came, a lot of debris. If this happens again, a company will change how this is handled: Our guys did a lot for us. Have seen other examples of privatization. Starts off with low costs, then they increase. Surprised at how low our employees are being paid. Our guys always pick up what we put out. A big company won't. On the matter of the Boy Scouts, this group is the best thing to happen for my son.

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*Vice Mayor Watts arrived at 7:11pm.*

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Chuck Ross: Ran my own numbers based on the budget. There is not adjusted numbers for the cost of our laborers. If we maintain in house, will have to adjust to pay better. We are already two men down. Difficult filling these positions. Don't think that the proposed fee is high enough to cover the rate increases needed. Regarding FP&L, much mis-information in the e-mails sent out. The wood poles are worse. This kills trees and poisons the environment. FP&L is providing what is needed for improving services to hospitals and police. Thing to do is make sure our residents are noticed and well prepared. Having concrete poles has not affected property values.

Janey Anderson: Concerned that we have not looked in to improving our in house operation and make necessary changes to keep it in house. There are always ways to make improvements to the current system and that has not been presented. If this is decided today, you only have one month to negotiate a contract. On FP&L has to be presented in an objective way. We need to get cooperation from the vendors. Last quote to bury the lines could be \$10 to \$15,000 per household just for FP&L. In regards to my property values, have seen a substantial increase in the last two years and a concrete pole was installed on the corner.

Judi Hamelburg: Ten years ago a committee of citizens were tasked to design a Public Works building. We looked at outsourcing and at that time we determined it was more cost effective to keep it in house. Every commission since then has not addressed the worker's rate of pay and improving equipment. They do a dirty job graciously and look out for us. We looked out for them by providing them a good facility. We have not charged the residents correctly. There is no way outsourcing can do it for less. It will be a teaser rate and then it will go up. Same happened when we charged to Miami Dade County for recycling. In the long run it will increase. These guys brought us ice and water after Katrina. Will not get this kind of service anywhere else. Have been fighting for them and will continue.

Dale Blanton: Thanks Barbara Kuhl for speaking on Boy Scout issue, and not to have the rental fees waived for them. Discrimination continues with the Boy Scouts.

Tracey Truppman: Agree with Dale Blanton and Barbara Kuhl on Boy Scout issue. On Sanitation, I support the crew. Don't understand the high amount for administration fees. Keep median maintenance in house. Keep recycling in house. However not sure how you will finance it. Have not heard from the staff and we should. Send out a "monkey survey" to residents to get more opinions. Get a full, complete picture of all options.

Dan Keys: On Boy Scout issue, Village should not waive fees. On outsourcing, based on experience of negotiating contracts, you can negotiate a good and favorable contract for the Village by extending out the rates for several years. Costs will continue to go up if kept in house, too. We can control increases within a contract. More concerned with the type of service. Want to keep service as is. Consider going to a one armed bandit for garbage and recycling. What are regulations if resident puts out garbage too early or too large? Employees look to be equitably treated and at higher salary.

Jacqueline Gary: You can do a better job with more money. Our garbage men were here for us after Hurricane Andrew. Always here to help us. Hope you vote to keep it in house. We are a small community. They work hard for us. Go ahead and raise the rates if needed.

Matt Kaminsky: We have property tax and millage issues. We do not have a sanitation issue. Your fault for not budgeting for new trucks. This is a budget issue. Why are you taking it out on the garbage department? How will this lower our property taxes.

Marie Smith: North Miami outsourced their sanitation. A lot of complaints. They had to get a liaison officer to handle complaints. What is the consensus of our workers? The Village is supposed to be a bird sanctuary. Make it a human rights sanctuary. Raise costs and keep it in house. Outsourcing companies are millionaires. Keep our workers.

David Tunnel: Those workers make this community. Have a great relationship with them. Would feel betrayed if they are not here. On FP&L issue, having concrete poles is a great concern. Ft. Lauderdale stalled the process and got FP&L to put underground. Need to look at all options. Wood poles would look more natural. This will change aesthetics. Exhaust all options first.

Milton Hunter: On outsourcing, a point is missed for some. What can we do in regards to money and the bottom line? Have to look at alternatives beyond five years. Have spoken to many and have only heard sentiments. No other way to capture franchise fees. If the will is to default in five years, then do nothing. This is a benefit for the employees and for the Village. Moved to Biscayne Park 22 years ago to get out of being a part of Miami Dade County. If you look at the numbers and look at this fiscally, we have no alternative but to outsource.

Gary Kuhl: Sentiment is an inaccurate word. The employees have been loyal and we should reciprocate. We can continue to outsource everything and be just like any other city in Miami Dade. A small town charm is what makes us different. Willing to pay more to keep in house. On Boy Scouts, strongly object to an organization that discriminates. A slap in the face to ask for the fee waiver.

Wayne Wetzel: 40 year resident. Watched park grow. Praised for its beauty. Our guys are great. Keep our city gorgeous. Our service is personalized. Don't want to see blue buckets in my Village.

Jorge Marinoni: This is an emotional issue. Everyone appreciates the work the guys do. Cannot see Biscayne Park surviving unless we raise taxes. We are limited on how much we can raise. To keep we will have to double the fees. We have to buy equipment. We need funds for a rainy day. Biscayne Park will disappear if we don't make changes. Manager is a professional. She did her research and she recommends outsourcing because this is the best for our community. If we don't have Biscayne Park, we lose these guys, the police, and everything we currently have. Accept what the Manager is telling us for the good of the Village. It is also good for the guys. Waste Pro is a small to mid sized company that cares. We can have the same people, but just different management. More resources to pay better and get more. This is in our control, unlike annexation which is in someone else's control.

Rose Madar: There are only 60-70 residents here. Not a representation of the entire Village. On outsourcing, we have an excellent staff. Outside company would not provide same service. There other things to do other than just garbage. On Boy Scout issue, need to be equal. On a code issue, should not have Code Officer taking pictures of my husband walking our dog. It was inappropriate.

Millie DiSanti: 43 year resident. The public is not aware of what is going on here. Spoke to 20 people who did not know. Only way to do this is to do a survey. Should not vote on this tonight.

Kate Winzenreid: Not in favor of getting rid of our staff. There are 1,200 properties and this affects each one of us. Only a small group here. Not publicized well. Object to the fact that those that make decisions are no longer here. Have outsourced medians already. Truck purchase can be mortgaged out.

Ed Chisholm: Invest in new trucks. Invest in our people. Invest in our community. Everyone here feels the same way.

Paul Spence: The guys are our friends and part of our family. They look out for us. They pick up things in the median. I live in Biscayne Park for the police and for sanitation. They go above and beyond. I'm not rich, but I will pay more to keep in house.

Wally Ilczyszyn: Not a resident. Represent the IUPAT union and was elected to speak on behalf of the employees. Majority of residents spoke here are in favor of keeping in house. Changing the sanitation rate will not bring down your millage. Don't understand why you want to kick the lowest paid employees to the curb. They provide the most service to the residents. In regards to Waste Pro, there is an article that shows there were 12 employees of Waste Pro in Port St. Lucie that were arrested for using fraudulent social security numbers. You know who the guys are that work in your community. Waste Pro will come in cheap and then will increase. What happens when the next hurricane comes.

Russell Mackie (Waste Pro Executive): Have attended meetings and acted with respect and sincerity. Bringing up information about my company that is 100% wrong is plain dirty. The Port St. Lucie situation had to do with employees that submitted fraudulent social security numbers before we had the ability to verify. When the E-Verify system became available to us, we were the ones that identified those employees and we terminated them.

Debra Greco: Newly appointed representative for IUPAT union. When the current union contract was opened up for negotiations, happy that the Village Manager wanted to increase their pay. Then a month later we are now here to talk about outsourcing. Proud to speak on behalf of the staff. Proud of what the community has had to say about them. This is a tough decision. They don't make a lot. Never complained. They don't want to go to Waste Pro. They are not in it for the money. A shame that after years of service, you are considering doing this. Union did not ask for an increase in pay. It was offered.

Linda Dillon: Don't want to see our services outsourced. This is not a difficult decision. Only decision is to keep. Look for ways to improve services and keep in house. Public Works department is one of the features that distinguishes us from other communities.

Lauren Caban: Moved here for three main things: Our own police department, our own garbage services, and commissioners that live here. You will make a decision you have to live with. Outsourcing is not the solution to increase revenues.

Rosemary Weis: Ditto. Never knew I didn't have to bring my trash can out to the curb. Willing to pay more. We have spent money on what we didn't need. Should not have gotten to this point. Proper pay and proper equipment should have been considered. I'll give up a few things to pay more and keep them. Many will agree.

Tim Chestnut (Public Works Supervisor): We only ask for one truck and two men to do the job. We asked for a lawnmower, and instead the median maintenance was outsourced. Do not want to go to Waste Pro. Many of us will not go. Love where we work. Not about the money. Hopes that this will not be detrimental to our job. Please keep us here.

Manager Shafran thanks the entire department for their support and communication during this process.

Ronald Escarment (Sanitation employee): Have been here 16 years. Loves the Village. Thanks the residents. Will continue to give them service. Have spoken to the Mayor and the residents. It's not about the money. Only need two more men and one truck. We do not want to go to Waste Pro.

Dan Samaria: Most residents are for keeping Public Works. I will go to every house and do a survey. Am willing to pay more. Don't want to see us outsource. 90 to 100% of the residents will support paying more to save them.

Chester Morris: I want to keep service as is. You have to vote your conscious on what you think is right for the Park. Take out personal and make the best decision. I am willing to pay more.

Manny Espinoza: The current facility was paid by a County grant. Have you reached out to the County to ask what will happen if not used for same purpose? Will go house to house and ask for a contribution to buy a truck. Let's keep the staff and keep in house.

David Twitchell: Share the feelings of gratitude to the employees. Let's hold on to them.

Franc Madar: Willing to donate \$500 for a new lawn mower. Looks for other residents to match.

Virginia Lott: Knows each of the guys. Want to keep them. In complete opposition to outsourcing.

Pam Garman: We want to keep our current staff. We care about them. Do not want to see outsource. Do a survey. Consider all of our time and effort to come out and speak on this.

Mr. Cuervas: Majority of people here willing to pay more. If you, the commission, are willing to pay more out of your paychecks, we can keep them.

12.f Request to waive rental facility fees for Boy Scout Troop 307

Manager Shafran received a request from resident James Murphy to waive the facility rental fee at the Ed Burke Recreation Center. The fee is \$50/hr and they are looking to use 2 hours per week.

James Murphy and Barry Ekle, Troop 307 leaders, were also present.

Attorney Hearn confirmed that since it is a public facility they cannot be denied use. Commission has the authority to waive the fees and to consider an in-kind donation for the use of the facility.

After Commission discussion, Commissioner Jonas made a motion to waive the fee for one year only and to see if Boy Scouts of America changes their policy. The motion dies for a lack of second.

There was consensus from the Commission to not waive the fees.

- 11.a** Village Manager recommendation regarding RFP 2014-01 - Outsourcing of garbage and trash collection services

Mayor Coviello proposes to further discuss putting this off for one year and to take a look at current operations. Also to allow time to find out what happens to our Annexation proposal.

After discussion, Commissioner Jonas makes a motion to hear the Manager's proposal and recommendation. It is seconded by Commissioner Ross.  
All in favor: Vice Mayor Watts, Commissioner Jonas and Commissioner Ross.  
Opposed: Mayor Coviello and Commissioner Anderson  
Motion carries 3/2.

Manager Shafran gave her presentation, outlining the process which included:

- > Details of the RFP (Request for Proposal)
- > The RFP Selection Review Committee that reviewed the four proposals received
- > Reviewing different options for collection services, scheduling and manner
- > Two community workshops

Based on the entire process including a financial analysis, the recommendation is for the Village to proceed with negotiating a contract with Waste Pro.

Following the presentation, Commissioner Ross makes a motion to proceed with 1) Accept Manager's recommendation and instruct the Manager to negotiate the terms of the agreement with Waste Pro; 2) Develop a Sanitation budget that would give us a true cost of keeping it in house and finding efficiencies, including bringing recycling in-house. It is seconded by Commissioner Jonas.

Further discussion on if it is outsourced, and the fee remains the same current amount, the difference would be put towards a separate road repair assessment. Attorney Hearn explained that it would have to be two separate assessments, one for sanitation and the other for roads.

With concern that there would not be enough time to complete the direction given in the motion, Manager Shafran asked for the Commission's availability to call for a special meeting between now and mid-May, if needed.

The motion was called to a vote:

Attorney Hearn announced that the Law Enforcement Assessment legislation passed. No response yet from the City of North Miami attorney on water utility agreement. If still no response, will come back in May seeking direction from the Commission. In regards to the police investigation issue, not at liberty to discuss due to limitations under Chapter 112 of the Florida Statutes. An independent investigator has been hired and comes highly recommended. Charges \$50 an hour and investigation may exceed Manager's limit of \$2,500. Looks to Commission for authorization to enter into contract with updates to the Commission on amount spent.

Commissioner Jonas makes a motion to enter into contract and to keep the Commission apprised of costs. It is seconded by Commissioner Anderson.


